#### What's Happening with Language Arts!

LA9 folks finished up their short story unit 1st quarter where they learned strategies of survivorship, following Sanger Rainsford and his use of hunting skills to fend off his preditor General Zarroff and then descended deep down into the catacombs with Montresor and Fortunado to learn of Fortunado's revenge. The LA9 crew put on their detective hats and uncovered literary terms that these authors used to create spine chilling events.

The students are also diligently working on learning new vocabulary and parts of speech each week to expand their reading comprehension and improve their writing skills.

Next on the agenda for the kiddos is to join the migrant workers on a ranch in Soledad with Lennie and George in *Of Mice and Men*.

LA10 finished up studying the Revolutionary Era and discovered the persuasive nature of the founding documents. The unit wrapped up with students giving a persuasive speech of their own. The students worked on developing speeches while utilizing Aristotle's appeals.

Next up for LA10 is a journey into Romanticism which will branch off into discovering the wonders of nature and of the self in transcendentalism. The unit will take a look into Gothic literature by focusing on the works of Edgar Allan Poe and Stephen King.

The first year of LA11 has wrapped up the memoir of Frank McCourt's *Angela's Ashes*. This gave students that opportunity to take a look at what life was like in Ireland during the 1940s.

The next selection will be Ishmael Beah's memoir, *A Long Way Gone*. This will give students a look at the life of child soldiers in Sierra Leone.

LA11 is in full swing getting the juniors ready for ACT testing by covering vocab, grammar and close reading strategies.

Stoughton's inaugural class in AP English Language and Composition has been busily learning the fundamentals of rhetoric. We have mastered our rhetorical terms and fought our way to crafting effective arguments. Now, we are applying our new understanding to *Julius Caesar*. While the bulk of our year is focused on examining the rhetorical triangle in nonfiction, we are analyzing this Shakespearean classic through a rhetorical lens: examining the speeches as samples of argumentation with implications for the characters, for the Elizabethan audience and for modern readers. Following the play, we continue our study of political rhetoric in foundational American documents, British satire, and a variety or contemporary political writings. We round out the semester by digging into a unit called Economics: Poverty, Wealth and the American Dream. Next semester, we will examine units on Community and Identity and finish the year with a unit on Technology. Not only does our wide range of topics prepare students for the rigors of the AP Test on Wednesday May 13, it also prepares them to constructively participate in the wider societal conversations. We look forward to growing this class for next year as more students discover the power of rhetoric.

#### Introduction to Journalistic Writing

# Stoughton High School Writers Attend UW-Whitewater Writing Festival

On November 15 SHS students interested in writing were fortunate enough to attend the 35th UW-Whitewater Creative Writing Festival. The festival opened with 750 students from Michigan, Illinois, Minnesota, and Wisconsin gathered together to hear keynote speaker lke Holter before releasing everyone to their writing workshops.

Ike Holter is a Chicago playwright and winner of The Windham-Campbell prize, one of the highest awards for writing *in the world*. He's the author of several award winning plays including "Exit Strategy", "Hit the Wall" and "Lottery Day", which have been seen all across the country. He offered his advice about writing and shared his experiences as a writer to inspire us all.

There were six sessions of workshops one could attend ranging in topics from poetry, children's story writing, fan fiction, and humor to essays and horror stories. In sessions, the genre of writing as well as student submissions were discussed amongst attendees and the facilitators who were either professors from Whitewater or professional writers from the Midwest. Students were especially excited about attending the song writing and multimedia workshops. The awards ceremony concluded the festival.

The English Department hosts this field trip and travels to the festival yearly with students in the literary writing classes and any other students interested in writing.
